- Externally marked

## SATs - What is tested?

- Spelling, Punctuation & Grammar (SPaG)
- Reading
- Maths Paper 1 Arithmetic
- Maths Paper 2 Reasoning
- Maths Paper 3 Reasoning





#### SPaG

- 45 Minutes to complete (punctuation and grammar)
- Around 50 questions
- 50 marks in total
- Spelling test is separate
- 20 spellings from Y3/4 and 5/6 Statutory spelling lists
- The two scores are added together for a total of 70 marks




- Paper 1 (arithmetic)

  - Total of 35 marks







## How to help at home

- Reading with your child 4 times per week
- Ask questions when listening to them read
- TT Rockstars
- Spellings
- Online resources / CGP books





#### Results

- Results are received in July with school reports
- Reported as a raw score and a scaled score
- Scale scores: 100+ is at the expected standard
- 2022 Thresholds
  - Reading 29 SPaG 35 Maths 58
- Thresholds vary each year
